


2023 seems so long ago!

2023 marked the 10th year in the life of the Annerley-Stephens History Group. Between **July-December 2023** there was considerable emphasis on finalising the plans or the ASHG History room in the new Yeronga Community Centre whilst continuing to run a successful events program. The Memories of Stephens conference was held in October 2023 at Our Lady's Annerley to a receptive and packed audience. Thank you Stephen and Glenda Sheaffe for convening and all the speakers and volunteers. Thanks also to Brisbane City Council through our local Councillors for financial support and to our local State and Federal representatives. We convened 3 very successful library talks at Annerley Library (Lothian Street history, Fiona Petty), Fairfield Library (History of Yeronga, Michael Macklin) and Holland Park Library (SLQ digitised maps, Stephanie Ryan). There were two history walks (Fanny St, Denis, Kate and Pauline) and Lothian Street (Fiona Petty). The Fanny Street Park, Annerley signage based on research by members Kate, Denis, Jeff and Pauline was installed by Brisbane City Council. Thank you Clr Johnston for commissioning ASHG to produce the signage. The research for Fairfield

Station was provided to the Cross River Rail team. We had stalls at Junction Fest and Moorooka Fun Day. In preparation for the new History room ASHG successfully applied for

a grant from the Brisbane City Council Brisbane Living Suburbs program (thanks Jeff and the team). A History Room transition team was formed to make recommendations about signage, furniture, displays etc. thank you Jeff, Denis, Pauline, Kate, Mark, Janis.




Here we are at the end of 2023 - the Yeronga Community Centre and the History room is nearing the end of its construction.



Achieving a significant milestone like the YCC takes years of work. ASHG and All Gauge Model Rail were selected as co-locators in the YCC with Community Plus+ as the head lease several years ago. Since about 2019 representatives from YCC, ASHG and AGMR representatives have met regularly with architects, designers, Economic Development Qld and the Department of Communities to finalise the design and the logistics of leases etc. Mel (Manager, YCC), Dennis (AGMRG) and Denis (ASHG) were part the process from the beginning. Thank you to them and all the team for your efforts. The photo above shows a very happy team of people celebrating the completion of the YCC.



The YCC was officially launched by Mark Bailey the MP for Miller in May 2024. Aunty Debby Sandy wished us all Wei Bulka (welcome).



Now we come to 2024. This diagram takes you through aspects of our achievements this year each of IS dealt with in more detail in the relevant slides. The most significant milestone was the **opening of the History room** in January 2024. Having a home has transformed how our history group operates. It has created many opportunities for ASHG to connect and engage within and external to the organisation. **Jan-October achievements in a nutshell.**

- The ASHG History room was established, equipped and ready to go in January 2024 with weekly drop in days and displays.
- 6 *Talking History* talks at Yeronga Community Centre with an average 40/45 attendees
- 2 library talks both fully subscribed
- 5th ASHG publication *Memories of Stephens* Conference launched Sept 2024

- Villa Street project connection, research, oral histories
- 1 new walk (2 presentations) Walking in the Warm Zone (fully subscribed)
- Participation in 5 external community events
- Participation in preparations for the 1925 Centenary of the amalgamation of formers shires into a unified BCC.
- Our online presence has been greatly enhanced with a revamped website and Facebook.
- Distinctive graphics thanks to volunteer designer Kerry Forsythe.



This slide speaks for itself. With the history room has come visibility, connections, engagement and opportunity.



We were successful in receiving a Brisbane City Council grant to set up room. The grant has enabled ASHG to create a flexible, well resourced history room that is fit for purpose. Thank you Brisbane City Council. Mark Baker created a display or maps and resources for the interior walls. The display takes advantage of the tracks system that are installed in the room. A library of donated books has been established by Susan and Kate McGuckin and is housed in the History room library cupboard. The room has a terrific projector and extensive cupboard space and tables and chairs. In addition ASHG has their own storeroom downstairs where the books, the marguee and other material is housed.



The history room drop in days each Wednesday have been staffed by a team of 8 volunteers: Kate McG, Susan, Jeanette, Pauline, Ollie, Sue, Denis with ongoing support form Les. Kate Dyson helped out with history window display and other ASHG business as it arose. The volunteers have opened up, hosted and welcomed people, heard local stories, sold books, enlisted new members, monitored the history window displays each Wednesday. A library comprising member donations is being catalogued by Kate and Susan McGuckin. Occasional additional drop in days were held throughout the year. The room has also hosted other history groups and been used from time to time for members as a place for quiet research. Two laptops are owned by ASHG including one donated by member Timna Green.




A major bonus for ASHG is the history display window and has enabled rotating displays including: Kate D and Pauline Peel (coordination and occasional displays including Frank Corley, Reconciliation Week) member Deb Kember (first five years of the Brisbane Golf Club), member Sue Rowan (Threads in Time, Domestic Art and; It Never Floods in Brisbane does it?), and the current display *Behind the Gardens* curated by Janis Hanley and Jan Richardson which features the Young and See families, descendants of Chinese market gardeners. We see exciting possibilities for 2025.



It is wonderful to have access to the YCC multi-purpose room for six of our successful 2024 Talking History series which averaged 40/45 attendees and a further 2 talks at the Annerley and Fairfield libraries both of which were fully subscribed. At each of these talks new connections have been made, stories shared, new ideas developed, new members enlisted and books have been sold. I want to acknowledge the members who volunteer at each of these events - 6-8 people each time set up pack up, sell books, help new and existing members and organise catering. Thank you.




We kicked off the year in February with the history of Yeronga Community Centre with Community Plus+ Manager Mel Hilditch and Resilience Coordinator Melinda McInturff. In March Dr Michael Macklin gave us an insight into the Naming of Yeronga and in April Kate Dyson talked to us about the history of the Clifton Hill War Service Homes Estate in her intriguingly titled talk: *Dickebusch St., the Street with no front doors*.



In May the Villa Street project team gave us an insight into the early learnings from the Villa Street community project.





In September the Lost Houses Panel (Lyn Burnett, John Horder and Kate Dyson with convenor Denis Peel) looked at a selection of houses across our suburbs lost, sometimes found and sometimes mysterious.




